Yolanda 'Lindy' Dunn dies at 99

Dunn was member of prominent Stagnaro fishing family

SANTA CRUZ » Yolanda "Lindy" Dunn, the last surviving member of the founding generation of Santa Cruz's prominent Stagnaro fishing family, died Saturday at her home in Santa Cruz. She was 99 and just five months shy of her 100th birthday.

1930s and as a cosmetologist at the Santa Cruz Pharmacy. She also worked as a hostess at her brothers' restaurant Malio's, and would often fill in for her sister Gilda at Gilda's restaurant.

Geoffrey Dunn said his mother was a big baseball fan her entire life, beginning with her devotion to the Italian ballplayers from California that played for the minor-league San Francisco Seals and later the New York Yankees, especially the San Francisco-born "Yankee Clipper" Joe DiMaggio.

When the New York Giants moved to San Francisco in the 1950s, Lindy became a devoted Giants fan.

During World War II, she became engaged to a serviceman who was killed central to the fishing comin action shortly before the two were to be married. "My mom grieved for many years for him," said her son. bo Several years later, she omarried Frank Dunn, a Pennsylvania native and WWII native who used to swim out to the end of the Pleasure Pier to flirt with her. Frank Dunn died in 2005.

Geoffrey Dunn said his mother suffered greatly at the loss of her siblings, to whom she was very close. Some of her siblings died in the 40s and 50s.

"Seeing her siblings die one by one was very hard on her," he said. "She was just devastated every time. It just didn't seem right to her that here she was, the middle child, and she turned out to be the last survivor." She also survived another son, Norman James Dunn.
