Power was restored by PG&E crews in the river front area shortly after

noon Sunday.

Commonwealth's winning entry was a giant Indian head with war bonnet and peace pipe, covered by thousands of red, yellow and white begonias picked by volunteers at Brown Bulb Ranch begonia gardens in Marina.

The blackout occurred at 12:05 a.m. Sunday when an underground electrical transformer on Stockton Avenue, between Capitola and Riverview Avenues, erupted into flames.

later Investigation showed that the fire apparently started when damaged insulation on the transformer's lead-in cables caused a short cir-

The accident blacked out more of the Capitola Village area, with power restored on the east side of Stockton Avenue several hours later.

But it wasn't until after noon, less than an hour before the scheduled start of the Nautical Parade, that power was turned back on in the residential area west of Stockton Avenue, including the riverbank construction areas.

In the meantime Sunday morning, Festival officials arranged, first with the owners of The Copa wine bar and then with the Venetian Motel, to enough electricity to power the festival's public address system, and the amplifiers for the Clean Machine band.

The Venetian Metel was contacted after a second

power outage blacked out thebusinesses along The Esplanade at 11 a.m., leaving the Venetian Motel — 300 feet away — as the only nearby source of PG&Esupplied power.

Orchard Supply Hardware and building contractor Larry Gordon both made portable generators available as a last resort source of electricity during
