Phone Increase Granted By PUC

San Francisco (AP).—The State Public Utilities commission granted increased telephone rates today—boosts that will add \$7.3 million to Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company revenues in three years.

An immediate increase of \$6.1 million a year will come from a boost in rates for installation service. The rest of the increase will come from charges for private line services, affecting newspapers and large businesses.

Under new rates the charges for reconnecting service—when there is a telephone in place—will go up from \$4 to \$7 for

No less than four separate motions are to be heard, beginning at 10 a.m., including three by the plaintiffs and a single motion to dismiss by attorneys for the city, defendant in the action.
