Marines To Face Atom Test Blast

Atomic Test Site, Nev. (P) — A force of 1900 U.S. Marines prepared today to face an atomic blast while crouched in trenches 4000 yards from the detonation

The shot is scheduled at 4:45

The shot is scheduled at 4:45 a.m. tomorrow on Yucca Flat.
When the ground quits shaking and the dust begins to settle, the Marines will leap from the trenches and move forward toward simulated objectives in what is termed a "vertical envelopment" attack

is termed a "vertical envelop-ment" attack.

Some of them will take off in 32 transport helicopters and fly to landing zones near the objec-tives. Twenty-four FOF Panther jet planes from the Mojave Mar-ine air base will fly simulated cover mission.

Track vehicles moving from the trench area will employ the "ontos," a new antitank weapon. Four observation planes will cruise overhead.

Brig. Gen. Harvey C. Tschirgi, commanding the exercise, said the men are of the 4th Marine Corps Provisional Atomic Exercise Brigade




