Davenport Citizens To Hold Mass Meeting Wednesday Night To Discuss Fire, Water Problems

Problems faced by the Davenport area as a result of the disastrous fire Saturday morning
which destroyed a two-story building housing Davenport's largest
general store and postoffice will
be discussed at a mass meeting of
area residents Wednesday night in
the dining room of the Ocean View
hotel starting at 8 o'clock.

Fire Chief Francis Gregory said
the session will be sponsored joint-

Fire Chief Francis Gregory said the session will be sponsored jointly by the Davenport fire department and the Davenport Improvement club. State, county and city water and fire officials will be invited to attend and to offer suggestions on how to meet the problems involved, Chief Gregory said. He also is mailing a letter concerning the meeting to residents of

the area covered by the fire department.

Adequate water will be one of the most important matters to be discussed. The fire chief said the 20,000-gallon reservoir was pumped dry by the Davenport fire truck in three hours. Fire trucks from paighboring communities from neighboring communities had to go to the Portland Cement company plant to obtain water with which to combat the flames,

In this connection, Chief Greg-ory expressed appreciation to Robert Kinzie, superintendent of the cement company, for the men, equipment and water sup-plied during the blaze.

Yesterday, two "spot" fires within the destroyed structure flared up and were quelled by firemen. The first was at 7 a.m. and was put out by Chief Gregory. The second was noted at about 3 p.m. Firemen kept a watch over the smouldering blaze all day Saturday and Saturday night.

The Davenport fire truck, which is kept in a garage adjoining the burned building, was placed in a shed of the Davenport Producers Saturday night for safety's sake, the chief said.

A permanent new location for the fire truck also will be discus-sed Wednesday night.

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The building was owned by the Coast Dairies and Land company. T. A. Morelli is operator of the Davenport Cash store which suffered heavy damage. Mrs. Myrtle Garaventa is postmaster at Davenport. Temporary postoffice quarters are in the Ocean View hotel, adjoining the destroyed structure. The hotel, owned by Charles Bella, was slightly scorched about the eaves but firemen credited a favorable wind prevented serious damage to the hotel.

Money orders, stamps and rec-ord books of the postoffice were rescued and there was no mail in the building when the flames

rescued and there was no main in the building when the flames broke out.

Chief Gregory said he had been informed that rebuilding plans by the Coast Dairies and Land company will not be announced until after fire insurance adjustors have made their survey.

Total loss was estimated at between \$60,000 and \$80,000 although the exact figure will not be known until a survey can be to de.

Chief Gregory point out that if the Davenport volunteer fire department had not been formed early last year, mutual aid from several neighboring communities would not have been available.

The Davenport firemen were assisted by the Santa Cruz fire department, Felton and Soquel forestry station crews, Live Oak volunteer department, Soquel volunteer department, Soquel volunteer department and Portland Cement company men.

Hundreds of motorists parked close to the fire and it was necessary for the highway patrol to direct and control traffic. Several leaf accidents were reported.
