\$22M project close to shopping, transit

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APTOS » The first night Laura Contreras spent in her new home, she cried.

Now 22 and raising a 2-yearold, housing had been a series of rooms since she became an adult, but never a home. That was impossible for someone going to school and working and trying to put together a life in high-priced Santa Cruz

Then a co-worker told her about Aptos Blue, a \$22 million, 40-unit low-income development that celebrated its grand opening Wednesday.

"Because I know how difficult it is to find affordable housing, I'm very grateful to have a home in Aptos Blue," Contreras said.

Situated on 5 acres between Rancho del Mar Shopping Center and The Forest of Nisene Marks, Aptos Blue is a muchneeded development serv residents making less than stoves and dishwashers, and 50 percent of area median in- many units have balconies

Officials, including U.S. Rep. Sam Farr, D-Carmel, praised the project for its proximity to public transit, parks, a library and shopping. The units are tucked inside six two- and three-story buildings, and the project includes the renovation of Aptos' historic Castro House, built in 1877 by rancher Vicente Castro and now serving as a community meeting space for residents.

But the project was not without controversy, as some neighbors objected, with some singling out five units set aside for residents suffering mental illness. The county has done that in other developments, and Santa Cruz County Supervisor Neal Coonerty said it is needed to help get people lead productive lives.

"I'm really grateful for the fact that that was part of the project," Coonerty said.

The units are efficiently designed, with open common areas and small bedrooms. The atchens ha reirigerators.

The project was developed by MidPen Housing, one of the Bay Area's largest providers of affordable housing. The agency also
