200-block auction nets city \$17,500

The auction last week of equipment and fixtures in the vacant businesses on Watsonville's 200 block of Main Street brought in \$17,500 to the city.

The auction grossed \$23,500, of which \$4,000 went to A&A Auction Galleries and \$2,000 went to cover expenses,

went to cover expenses, according to city Administra-tive Services Director Chuck Comstock.

The auction held last Tuesday took a crowd of more than 200 from store to store on the south-ern part of the block. They started at the El Rio Laundro-mat on Rodriguez Street, working their way down Rodriguez to First Street, stopping at the Philippine Gardens on First, and moving around the corner onto Main Street, ending up at Daylite Market.

All those businesses are now empty, stripped of whatever valuable furniture or equipment was left when the city took over

the property.

Yesterday, the city demo-lished what remained of the old Watsonville Appliance store after a fire there last week.

The next step is the demoli-tion of the rest of the buildings on that part of the block to make way for a post office—something the city sees as a key move in the redevelopment

of downtown.

The city is now accepting bids for the demolition, Com-stock said, and the bid should be awarded late this month or early next month.

The demolition will probably begin in January, Comstock

Even as the city moves ahead ith clearing two-thirds of the block for the post office, businesses on the rest of the block are still open. The city has already bought most of those properties and is renting them back to the business owners.

An agreement to purchase Fred's Barber Shop at 267 Main St. for \$92,000 is expected to be approved at a special meeting of the city Redevelopment Agency this afternoon.

Once that agreement is approved, the only purchases yet to be completed by the city are of the Daylite Market property and Pete Sanchez' prop-erty, which includes his erty, which includes his Pasatiempo Club and two restaurants.
