Mayor Invites 88 To Work On Master Plan

Letters were mailed this morning inviting 88 Santa Cruz area residents to participate on the citizen's advisory committee for city master plan development.

Those accepting the appointment will work on one of nine subcommittees, heads of which already have been appointed by Mayor Ted Foster. Realtor Joseph Nittler is general chairman.

In his contact letter, Dr. Foster sets an organizational meeting of the committee as a whole for 7 p.m. Tuesday in city council chambers.

The advisory subcommittee will be expected to formulate community goals in their respective fields and suggest ways and means of achieving them.

Planner Sid Williams has been retained by the city to assist the planning department in correlating committee efforts into the formal master plan.
