Rain Will Help City's Water Supply

The weekend rainfall that amounted to just under threequarters of an inch provided a breather for pumps at the San Lorenzo plant, Water Superintendent Weston Webber reported today.

Operating 16 hours daily since early this month-more than two months ahead of normal schedule—the pumps were not needed yesterday and probably won't be used for "a couple of weeks" even if there is no more rain, Webber said. Strawberry irrigators and

home gardeners will use less water in the next fortnight due to the rain, he said.

"If we get no more rain we'l probably start to pump within couple of weeks," Webber pro

dicted.

Four inches of precipitation i what the Santa Cruz watershe really needs to take the system comfortably over the critical tw month period between mid-Ju and mid-September, he sai Scanty rainfall since the first the year forced the pumpin plant into premature operation early in April.

Coastal sources, the river at water department wells will pr vide enough water to squee through the summer without r tioning but it would be a "tigh situation unless the dry spell w broken, Webber said last week.

Three additional inches of ra will forestall further 16-hourday pumping until late in Jun

he said today.
