Santa Cruz Buses Reprieved

SANTA CRUZ — The buses will continue to roll in the Santa Cruz area — at least temporarily.

Santa Cruz County Supervisors, by a 3-2 vote, Tuesday approved a subsidy agreement with Santa Cruz Transit Co., whereby the company will receive \$350 a month from the county.

A legal question, however, may arise. Most money appropriations require at least a four-fifths vote of the supervisors.

Supervisors Robert Burton and Vincent Locatelli voted against the agreement, saying the City of Santa Cruz' share should be higher by about \$50 a month.

Under the agreement, City of Capitola would pay the company \$100 a month, Santa Cruz would pay \$550, and the county \$350. The ratio is based on the

number of bus lines in each area.

Chester Smith, company owner, had threatened to go out of business unless financial support is forthcoming. He contends the company is losing about \$1,000 a month.

A possible legal loophole that would allow the county to appropriate money for its share could be that the money does not have to be transferred from another county fund. Such a transfer appropriation would require a four-fifths vote.

County Auditor-Controller George S. Kriz Tuesday said that supervisors have a fund from which the appropriation can be made.

Burton and Locatelli contend the City of Santa Cruz should pay an extra \$50 a month for the County General Hospital bus run, which is inside the city.

They say the county should pay a maximum of \$300 and the City of Santa Cruz \$600, instead of \$550 a month.

Last week the subsidy agreement failed to get supervisors' approval. It failed by a 2-2 vote, with Burton and Locatelli voting against it.

Supervisor Francis Silliman was absent from that meeting. On Tuesday, Silliman voted for it, passing it by a 3-2 vote. Voting with Silliman were Chairman Thomas Black and John (Russ) McCallie.
