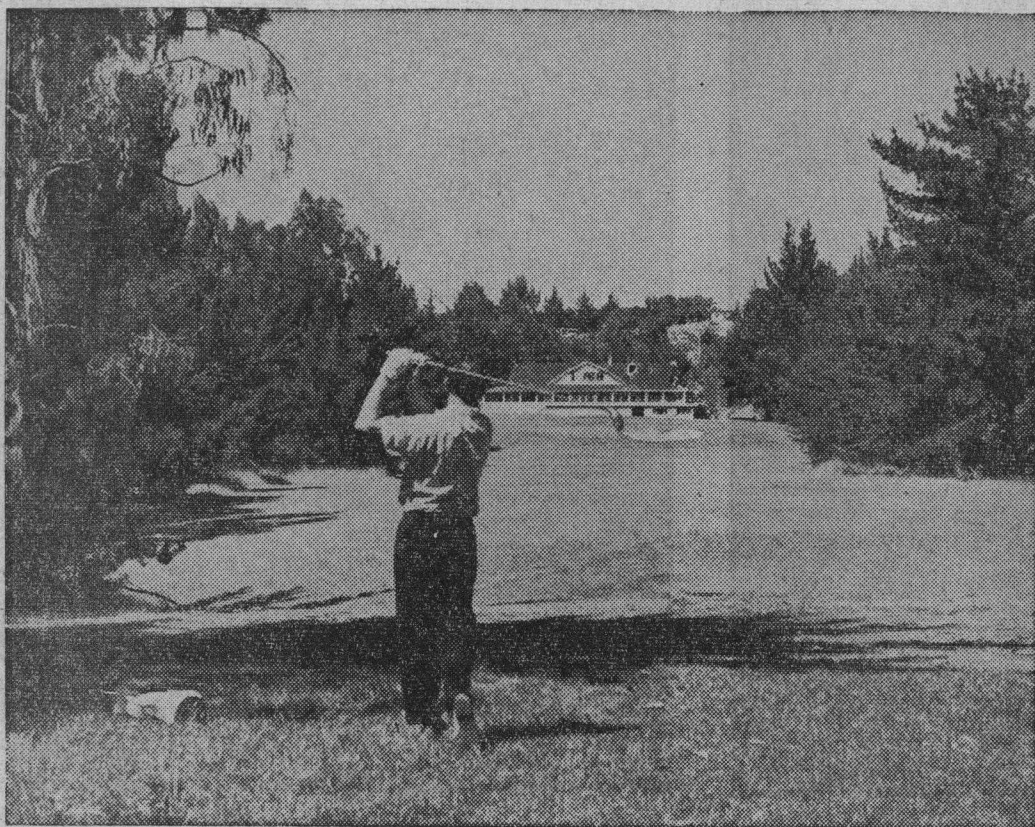


Aptos Beach Golf Course Opens Tomorrow

The Pro Tees-Off On 18th



Ed Holbrook, Aptos Beach Golf club pro-manager, tees off in a practice round on the 18th hole at the new course, slated to open tomorrow morning.

The course will open the back nine holes for public use, with the front nine slated for an opening August 1. The club

house can be seen as you look up the foreground. It will not be ready for tomorrow's opening but it is hoped it will be ready later in the week.

Golfers Can Plan 9 Holes On Backside

With the dawn tomorrow morning, a familiar sound, absent for the past 15 years, will ring in the ears of Rio del Mar residents.

The whip of the club, and the smack of the wood hitting a golf ball, will once again toll at Aptos Beach Golf club, 15 years ago known as the Rio del Mar Country club.

Nine holes will be ready for play, after being delayed by the early spring rains, Henry W. Howard, vice president and secretary of the corporation, announced last week. The backside with the front side expected to be ready about August 1, will open to the public.

Four partners formed a corporation which has put forth many hours and much labor with many good ideas to bring the "old" course back into reality, fulfilling many dreams by Santa Cruz county residents in that area. The partners are Harry A. Mohler, R. Jerrold Hooper, Harry B. Teller and Howard.

Yardage on the back nine, which will be ready for play tomorrow, numbers 3250. It will be a par 36. Longest hole on the backside is the 11th, a distance of 480 yards. The shortest is the 17th, 125 yards. When the front nine opens, the first hole will surpass the 11th as the longest, when golfers will be forced to hit the ball 530 yards to reach the cup.

In 1928, the golf course originally opened and remained open for 14 years, closing during World War II, in 1942.

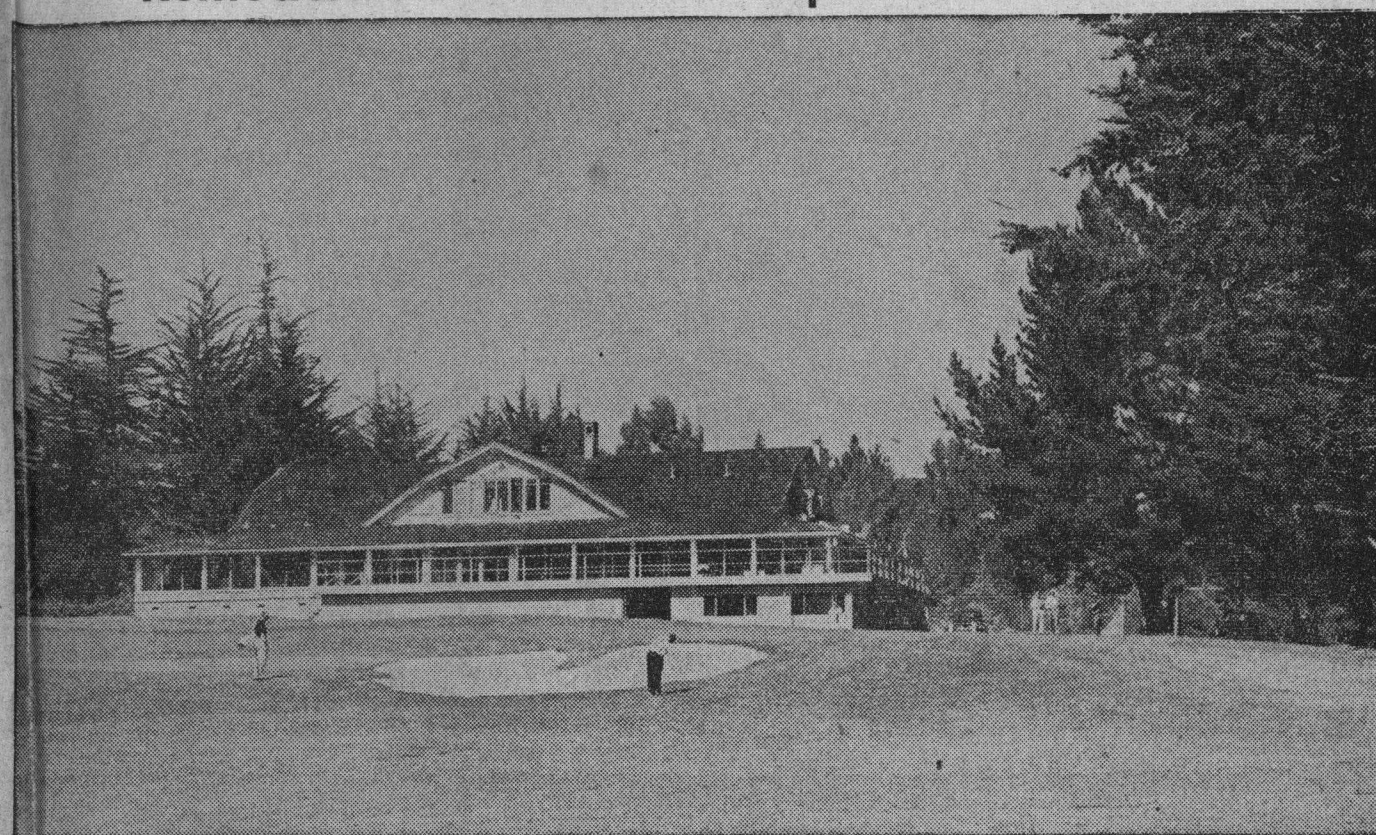
The club house at the course has been remodeled but will not be ready for the Monday opening. It will be ready sometime within the next week. A new modern deck at the club house overlooks the ninth and 18th greens with a beautiful view of the bay through a perfect setting of pine trees which outline the fairways in the background.

Ed Holbrook has been named as the new pro-manager at Aptos and he comes to Santa Cruz county from the Green Hills Country club in Millbrae, where he served as manager from 1946 to this year.

Holbrook has been active in golf since 1927, but this will be his first job as a pro. He served as assistant pro to Earl Nagel, now at Tilden Park in Berkeley, at the start of his career. In 1934 Holbrook became manager of Ingleside, where he served his term as assistant pro.

Pearman Is Upset Winner In AAU Quarter-Mile

Dayton, Ohio (AP). — Reginald Pearman, 33-year-old sprinting star of the New York Pioneer club, last night upset both the Olympic and NCAA champions as he raced to a new meet record of 46.4 in the 69th annual AAU quarter-mile.

Charles Jenkins of Villanova, the Olympic 400-meter champion, finished third behind John Telford of Wayne State university.

Pearman, former New York university athlete, won his first AAU championship 10 years ago in taking the 800-meter crown and last night's effort was his best-ever in the quarter-mile as he erased the 46.6 meet record set in 1954 by Jim Lea of the USAF.

Robert Backus of the New York Athletic club, broke his own American and meet records in the 6-pound weight throw with a prodigious heave of 44 feet 8½ inches.

His meet record was 43 feet and his American record, set a year ago, was 44 feet 2 inches.

The club house at the new golf course will feature a restaurant and bar managed by Arnett Fallis, former manager of Paso Robles inn.

Fallis will also run the Aptos Beach inn, formerly the fabulous Rio del Mar hotel. This inn will feature 36 rooms and baths and is being remodeled with plate glass windows being installed facing the ocean. The completion date is set for approximately July 19.
