# Salary Increases Okayed —Despite Strong Protests

About a third of the county's civil service employees will get a pay raise, but they managed to do so by only a narrow 3-2 vote of approval by the board of supervisors yesterday.

The hike will cost the county approximately \$90,000 more a year in wages.

Approval was given over the vehement protests of Supervisors Vince Locatelli and Robert Burton.

"Some people will be getting raises who don't deserve them," Locatelli growled. "Like Burton said before, how many will quit if we don't raise their pay — None."

Board Chairman Francis Silliman said the salary increases, recommended by the civil service commission, were not based on the capability of personnel in the various positions but on the duties and responsibilities of the respective jobs.

"This will put the salaries in their right perspective and eliminate many inequities," he commented.

Locatelli said that the commission's survey was unfair and the "whole thing should be thrown out and we should start all over."

"The county can't afford an increase in wages," added Burton.

After the vote was taken, Burton asked Personnel Director Charles Shean to speak on why

the increases were based on the positions not the personnel in them.

"It's our job to determine the level of duties and responsibilities of each position. It's not the personnel department's duty to evaluate the employee. That's a department head's job," answered Shean.

"If that's right, we might as well replace you with an IBM machine," Burton commented.

"People have been replaced by machines before," parleyed Shean with amusement.

Supervisor Hulda McLean's motion to accept the increases as recommended by the civil service commission and amended by the board in a few places at the ordinance's second reading was the fourth attempt made before a motion got a second.
