The Santa Cruz man's 'tag' is an attack on cops, and a prosecutor describes him as incorrigible.

A convicted graffiti vandal whose tag was a defiant attack enforcement law was tenced to seven months in jail by a judge in Santa Cruz on Thurs-

day.

Michael Pacifico Carrillo, 21, of Santa Cruz, was found guilty of felony vandalism by a jury in June. He was convicted of doing an estimated \$20,000 damage to railroad cars and buildings at the RMC Lonestar cement plant in RMC Lonestar cement plant Davenport in September 1992.

Assistant District Attorney Peter Morgan, who told the judge he thought Carrillo was incorrigible thought Carrillo was incorrigible and belongs in state prison, said the young man's signature tag was "FTL," the first initials of an obscenity and "the law."

'Pure maliciousness' "In my years here, I have never seen a more disturbing case," Morgan told Municipal Court Judge Robert Atack. "The defen-Judge Robert Atack. "The dant behaved out of pure ciousness. . . . This is simp

ciousness.... This is simply an act of evil."

Morgan said that during the jury trial, an album of photographs of Carrillo's tag, including some on the railroad cars, was introduced into avidence. simply

introduced into evidence.

He said the tag has been spray painted throughout Santa Cruz

County and even over the hill on a building near Lexington Reservoir, near Los Gatos.

Despite Morgan's plea, Atack sentenced Carrillo to 210 days in county jail and ordered him to county jail and ordered him to perform 500 hours of community service, to stay away from tagfrom taggers and spray paint and to make restitution. The amount of resti-tution will be determined at a hearing in September.

Grafitti on police car Morgan said Carrillo had been on probation once before — for head-butting a Capitola police officer attempting to subdue loud guests at a party. After being arrested for assaulting the officer, the prosecutor said, Carrillo used blood from his own nose, injured when he butted the officer, to write his tag on the patrol car. Carrillo also gave Nazi salutes to police officers, he said, and referred to them as pigs.

"I doubt very much whether probation is going to have any effect on this man," Morgan said.
