He added that such a district "would create a greater distance between the local voting public and its representative board and school administration. This continuing erosion of local control would seem to deny the effectiveness of our republican form of democracy.

The county board's comment was that just because state law now allows them to put higher supervisors' salaries up for a vote is no reason to suddenly decide if a supervisors job should be parttime or full-time.

"The real question raised by the jury's recommendation is whether people who have to work for a living should be systematically excluded from the board of supervisors to make room for the retired, the independently wealthy, and the career politician," supervisors replied.






