Hospital expansion opposed by state agency staffers

recommending that Dominican Santa Cruz Hospital be denied a Certificate of Need for a proposed 114-bed addition.

The state Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development will hold a public hearing Monday, Dec. 22, on the hospital's application for the Certificate of Need required before the hospital can receive any federal or state reimbursement for services provided in the new facility.

The hearing will be held at 10 a.m. in the county's Emeline Street complex.

Dominican won approval from the Mid-Coast Health Systems Agency board for the certificate after the HSA staff opposed it.

The hospital is proposing construction of a 59,100square-foot addition that would include 47 medicalsurgical beds, four intensive care and four coronary care beds, six pediatric beds and 53 skilled nursing beds.

The hospital would also add two surgical operating rooms, one radiology room and expand the space allocated to the physical occupational, speech and respiratory therapy services, clinical laboratory,

Total construction cost is \$14,057,000.

The state Office's Division of Certificate of Need, in a staff report, said it will recommend denial of the total application.

It cites many of the same objections used by the HSA staff and Community Hospital of Santa Cruz representatives in opposing the certificate application.

It said Dominican wants to build 47 new medicalsurgical beds while the Statewide Health and Facilities Plan adopted in 1980 records an excess of 94 beds in the Santa Cruz area.

The state agency added that while Dominican is asking for six new pediatric beds and there is a need for 12 beds, the hospital had nine designated pediatric beds reclassified to medical surgical beds on Dec. 1, 1979, and has made no attempt to redignate existing beds into the pediatric category.

It also pointed out that the hospital is asking for an additional eight ICU/CCU beds while the state plan shows a need for only four additional beds in the Santa Cruz area.

The state also points out that Community Hospital is operating at approximately 35 percent of its capacity

and repeats Community's claim that Dominican's expansion will adversely affect growth of Community.

It also mentions that local convalescent hospitals had enough beds for Skilled Nursing Facility patients in the area, and that new beds rate in the community, impacting economically.
