Scotland Arrives In Ben Lomond

Water from the original Loch Lomond in Scotland, flown here with the help of the United States Navy arrived yesterday to be poured into the New Loch Lomond of Santa Cruz County next Sunday at the festival and dedication of the lake.

The dream of many Ben Lomond citizens to accent the Scottish atmosphere around the little mountain town will come true at their first annual festival next weekend.

Starting Saturday, there will be two days of marching, dancing, singing and bag pipe band competitions - to all of which the public is invited. Sunday at 11:30 a.m. the festival will be climaxed by the dedication of Loch Lomond.

When the Polaris submarine base at Holy Loch in Scotland heard that the California town of Ben Lomond was planning its festival to christen its new 3-mile long lake "Loch Lomond", Lt. James A. Buckner, public infor-

mation officer stationed on the submarine tender Hunley, agreed to fly the water over. With the help of Joe Storminger, Lockheed representative at Holy Loch, the water was promptly drawn from Loch Lomond, placed in a gallon Scotch jug and placed on a plane bound for Ben Lomond. Holy Loch is close to Loch Lomond.

Yesterday the stout box containing the jug was opened by Terre Taylor of Soquel on the shores of the new lake at Newell dam. Terre, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Taylor of 5593 Old San Jose Road, and a graduate of Soquel High School, is one-fourth Scottish. This and her figure qualified her to wear a newly designed bikini made from the special Scottish plaid originated by the Holy Loch citizens in honor of the American Polaris submarine sailors who are stationed there.

On Sunday, Terre, who played the star role in the Santa Cruz Theater guild production of under the Yum Yum tree, will hand the water over to Mrs. Wesley Hopfer of Ben Lomond, leader in the campaign to name the new lake Loch Lomond. She will pour the Scottish water in the lake to climax the christening.

Saturday's program will open with the raising of U.S. and Scottish flags at 9:30 a.m. at the fire house plaza. Novice Scottish dancing will start at 10:00 a.m. in the recreation park. The festival parade begins at 11 a.m. down the main street. It will be led by four or five bagpipe bands followed by a mass formation of other bands. A bagpipe band competition, which has drawn entries from Canada and from as far south as San Diego, will be judged by Charles Cochrane, of New Zealand, world renowned

Sunday's dedication at the lake will be followed by Scottish entertainment at the recreation park.

The Business Association of Ben Lomond through its chairman of the festival, Brent Rice, assures visitors that all the fun will free. Buses will be available on Sunday to take visitors the short distance to the lake for the dedication. The lake, formed by the waters behind the recently completed Newell Dam, is filled with trout and open on a limited basis for fishing. Redwood and fir trees dot the surrounding hills.

Daily serenading by a kilted bagpiper is already under way in Ben Lomond.

During the festival Scottish food from authentic Scottish recipes will be served at various restaurants and stands. The Buchanan tartan from the Scottish Loch Lomond country has been adopted by the California Ben Lomond as its official colors.


