

Santa Cruz Librarian Named At Special Session Of Board

Mrs. Geraldine Work Will Take Over New Duties Here July 1

Mrs. Geraldine Work, librarian at the Pacific House library on Treasure Island during the World's Fair, was named the successor to Miss Minerva Waterman as head of the Santa Cruz public library at a special meeting of the library board yesterday.

The appointment followed several weeks of interviews with six or more candidates who had applied for the post which Miss Waterman has resigned effective July 1.

Miss Waterman has been librarian here for over 50 years.

Mrs. Work, a graduate of the University of Southern California school of librarianship, has held several responsible posts in various parts of the state. Her present post is supervisor of libraries in the elementary schools of Alameda and Contra Costa counties.

She has served in the past as assistant county librarian at Colusa, county librarian of Tehama county, and reference librarian at the state library in Sacramento.

She will assume her duties here immediately after Miss Waterman's resignation becomes effective, according to George Cardiff, library board chairman.

A work stoppage by the hard coal miners of Pennsylvania was ordered for Monday by the United Mine Workers' union. Operators failed to agree to a contract. The latter offered a year extension of the contract.
