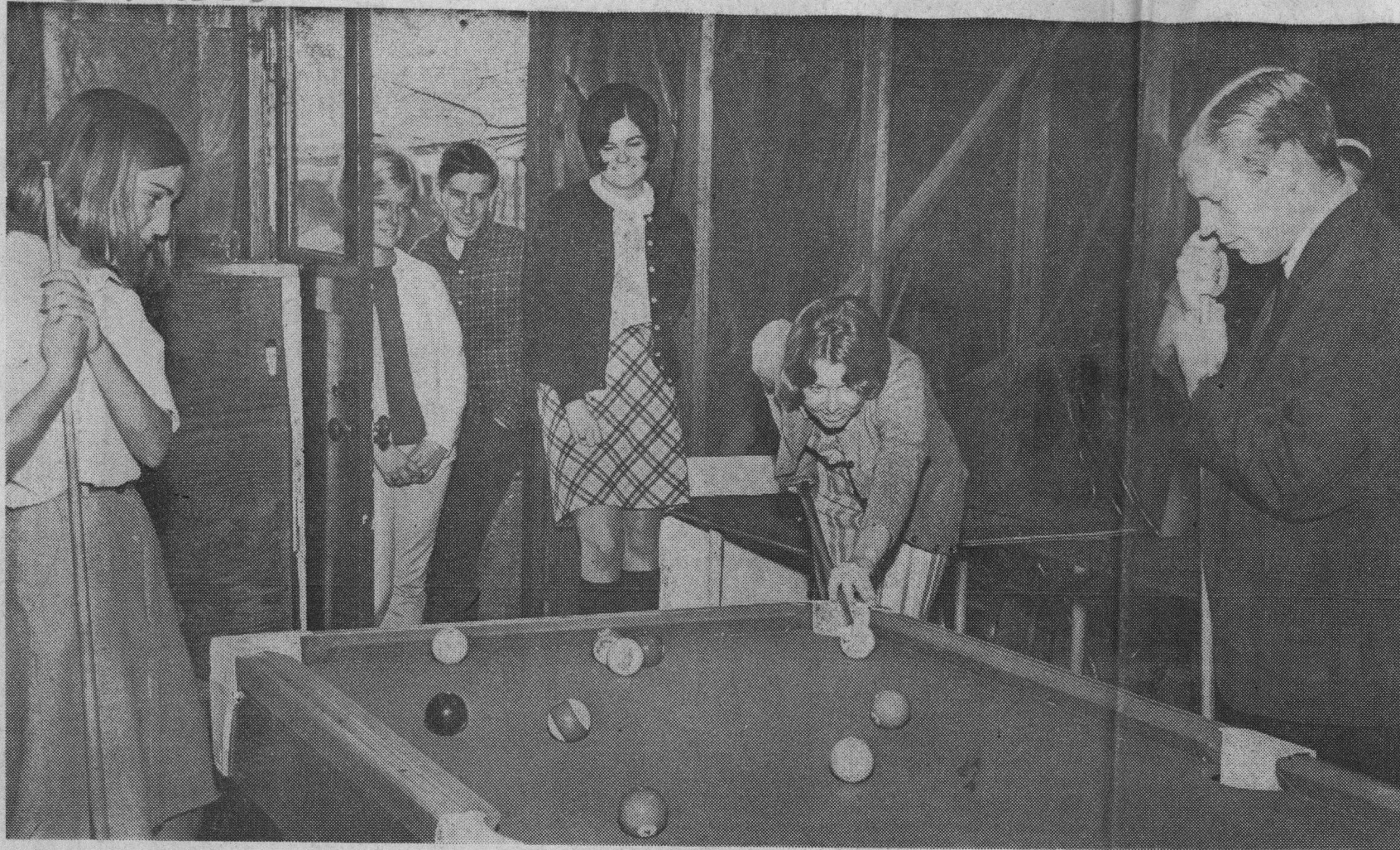


Cabrillo
