The approval is conditional until the educational policy committee meets this afternoon regarding the library facility within the college, which was designed by Ernest J. Kump Associates of Palo Alto.

Tentative construction costs are \$2,850,000 for 350 students in residence and facilities for 150 commuter students. It will contain a total of 124,484 square

feet.

Estimated building costs per square foot of \$22.89 is below the costs of residence halls at Berkeley and Riverside campuses.
