# Newell Creek Recreation Rules Set

"On or about May 1" is the time scheduled for opening of temporary recreation facilities at Newell Creek reservoir.

The date, rules and regulations and other details were unanimously adopted by Santa Cruz City councilmen last night.

These were included in three resolutions:

1. Broad five-point policy based on the original Foster-McBain report.

2. Authorization for the city manager to apply for state department of public health clearance.

3. Specific rules, regulations, and fees for the project.

The city manager is authorized to regulate the project and is empowered to add or modify the rules as he sees fit. Enforcement will be by water department employees.

Specifically forbidden, to provide for maintenance of the watershed area, are boating, bathing, camping, hunting, or shooting, unauthorized fishing, and trespassing.

A limited number of \$1 per day parking permits will be issued

Sacramento (P) — Funds for constructing boating facilities would be boosted \$175,000 a year under a bill approved Tuesday by the Assembly Public Utilities and Corporations Committee.

Criminal violations will be enforced by county officials since the recreation area is in county territory.

and may be obtained in advance at the water department office, Santa Cruz city hall.

Persons 16 and over must pay an admission charge of 50c per day, to be paid at entrance to recreation area. Those under 16 will be admitted free.

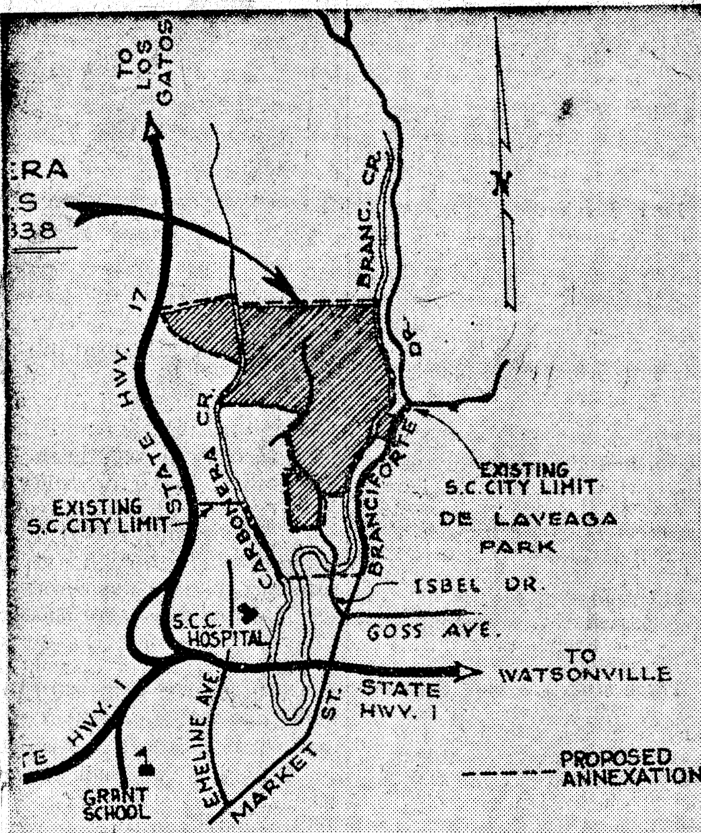
Fishing days will be Wednesday, Saturday, Sunday, and holidays from 6:30 a.m. to sunset, or as otherwise authorized by the city water director.

All pets are barred from the area. Open fires are banned and smoking is limited to prescribed areas.

Sanitation controls covering disposal of human wastes, garbage and washing will be strictly enforced.

State fishing regulations, including possession of a state fishing license, will govern the area.

If the forest fire hazard in the recreational area becomes high, the area may be closed at the discretion of the city manager.



Formerly a part of the Bartlett property north of the Santa Cruz county hospital, the 120-acre "uninhabited" Carbonera Estate development can be annexed to the city because it includes the legally required 400-foot wide connecting corridor to city boundary north of Branciforte

drive. Main entrance to the 175-lot development will be provided by a road connecting with Highway 17 near Pasatiempo overpass. Isbel drive, providing access through the county area to the city at Market street, is unimproved at present.

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
