Scotts Valley Water Bond Election Slated Tomorrow

The fate of the lower San Lorenzo-Scotts Valley zone's future in the Newell Creek dam project will be decided in a \$175,000 general obligation bond issue tomorrow.

A large tournout is expected for a general information meeting at 8 o'clock tonight sponsored jointly by the Scotts

Valley chamber of commerce and the Community club. The public gathering will be in the Community Barn.

Approximately 1500 persons are eligible to vote, according to County Clerk Tom Kelley. For the measure to pass, two-thirds of the votes cast must be affirmative.

The only question facing the voters is: Do you wish to incur a bonded indebtedness of \$175,000 to obtain a one-eighth share in the Newell Creek dam and reservoir project? A "yes" or "no" vote is called for on the ballot.

If the bond issue passes, the zone will receive an annual yield of 500 acre feet of water which will be impounded in the dam for future use. Cost to the average taxpayer is estimated at a maximum of 25 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. Plans call for the bond issue to be paid over a 25-year period.

A \$5.5 million bond issue to underwrite the entire cost of the bond issue for the dam and reservoir project is planned by the city for the November 4 general election. The project has a total yield of 4000 acre feet.

Engineer Patrick Creegan and directors of the zone and county flood control and water district (board of supervisors) will be at the public meeting tonight. Walter Dubois, chamber president, is in charge.

Voting will take place at four election precincts from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. They are: Mount Hermon association bible hall lounge

(precinct A), Mount Hermon area; Zayante school (precinct B), residents of Glen Arbor, Zayante and Paradise park; Scotts Valley school (precinct C), residents of Happy Valley (east of the Los Gatos highway), Glenwood and the Scotts Valley library (precinct D) for residents of Scotts Valley (west of the Los Gatos highway), Bean creek and Manana Woods,

Big Welcome Given Nautilus In New York

New York (P). — The atomicpowered submarine Nautilus, fresh from her historic passage under the North Pole ice, got a whistling, cheering but rainy welcome from New York today.

The sleek craft entered the world's busiest port in significant affirmation of its lack of danger to the public safety. Later, Rear Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, the father of nuclear submarines, discounted completely the recent fears of England and Denmark about permitting such craft in heavily populated areas.

Police helicopters circled a flotilla of about 20 navy destroyer escorts, coast guard cutters, tankers, tugs, police launches and fireboats. They escorted the Nautilus through the harbor, part way up the Hudson river, and then around the tip of Manhattan head-
