UCSC Sends Out 2000 Applications For 1966, Aims At 700 Enrollment

Over 2000 applications for admission to the University of California at Santa Cruz for fall of 1966 were put into the mail

today.

While the first class of 660 students was undergoing counseling sessions and orientation, the student services office was looking ahead to next year.

"We will be able to admit only about 700 students next fall," said Howard B. Shontz,

assistant chancellor.

"This does not mean, however, that UCSC will not accept additional applications. Under the university rules the first 80 per cent of the qualified students who apply will be admitted.

Thus, students may apply for admission to UCSC until March

1, 1966.

"Qualified students who cannot be accommodated at Santa Cruz will be assured a place on another UC campus," Shontz said.

The Santa Cruz campus is scheduled to grow by controlled increments, beginning with a second residential college, named for the late Adlai Stevenson. It will open its doors in the fall of 1966, and will share with Cowell college the estimated 1350 students who will be enrolled.

Currently under construction, Stevenson college will be headed by Provost Charles Page, former professor and chairman of the department of sociology at Princeton
