## urvivor identifies Carpenter as killer

By MATT SPEISER LOS ANGELES -"It's that gentleman sitting right there."

Pointing at David Joseph Carpenter as he said those words. Steven Haertle brought to a climax 40 minutes of compelling testimony in Los Angeles County Superior Court and provided evewitness identification of the man accused of being the Trailside killer.

Haertle, 23, is the only surviving victim of the man who killed as many as a dozen people in northern California between 1979 and 1981. Thursday he took the stand and recounted in excruciating detail how he and Ellen Marie Hansen were shot, she fatally, as they took a hike through Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park March 29, 1981.

"(I recognized him) from when we previously came down the trail. He was walking out around the corner. He spoke first. He says, 'Ah, we've met again.' ...

"Then he pulled out a gun from his jacket. He pointed it at Ellen and I. (And said) 'Do as I say... You won't get hurt."

"I said, 'Be careful, El. He's got a gun.'

"He directed me to go down the trail. He pointed at me and told me to go down the trail. I took a step backwards.

"Ellen said, 'Don't listen to him, Steve. Don't do what he says.'
