mother Lynn Rubin, a family friend and a social worker. The baby and his mother were found in a local park days after the birth by two Santa Cruz women, who took the pair to Dominican

who took the pair Santa Cruz Hospital The baby spent a week there and was released to Rubin, who was assigned a social worker from Child Protective Services and given vouchers to stay at the Black-burn House Motel in Santa Cruz.

The social worker reportedly checked on Rubin daily to ensure she was taking good care of the

baby. Physician Kristina Muten, who saw the baby two days before his death at the Westside Community Health Center, would discuss no details of the case but confirmed the baby was in good health when she saw him.

Two days after the medical check up, the baby died.

A woman claiming to be Rubin called the Sentinel last week and complained that facts in an Oct. 5 story about the baby's death were incorrect, but she refused to dis-cuss details or meet with reporters.

Rubin checked out of the Black-burn House Motel after the baby's death, and has told authorities she

is staying with friends.

Police say they are gathering evidence and waiting for a medical examiner's report, which may be forwarded to the Santa Cruz County District Attorney for possible prosecution.
