First Jr. College Trustees Elected

Conelly In Close Win Over Browne

The second phase in the establishment of a junior college in Santa Cruz county was determined yesterday by 18.9 per cent of the county voters.

They selected a sevenmember board of trustees whose choice of college president and policies will ultimately determine the academic quality of the institution.

The voting was as follows with the winners listed first: Area 1—Carl Conelly, 3592; Dr. Edwin C. Browne, 3515; Herb Seal, 669. Area 2—Albert Rice, 4206; Erva Bowen, 2361; Robert L. Schatz, 828. Area 3—Keith Shaffer, 5859; Richard Spatz, 1454. Area 4—Arthur Hubbard, 3704; Dent Snider, 2405; Helen Weaver, 1477. Area 5—Marguerite Blaisdell, 3861; Dr. Forrest Murdock, 3507. Area 7—Joseph Chamberlain, 6982, unopposed.
