Awards Spotlight Good Design

Owners of tastefully remodeled and newly constructed houses and businesses were presented with awards during an annual award dinner sponsored by SCOPE, an organization that aims to protect the quality of environment in Santa Cruz County.

Among the winners in the Victorian house category were: Mr. and Mrs. Monte Lewis' house at 128 E. Beach St., Watsonville, which was recognized for its painting color scheme; a house at 516 Caledonia owned by Jack and Colette Seiple, which was singled out for its total Victorian concept; a house at 215 Walnut Ave. owned by Pat Sherwood, recognized for its restoration; a house at 240 Walnut Ave. owned by Tia Baldwin, also noted for its restoration.

A commercial Victorian at 603 Mission St., owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Parrish, was also given an award. New commercial property singled out was the Fidelity Savings building

designed by Ellmore Titus Architects Inc.

For new single family architectural design, the the honors went to Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Simpkins, owners of a house at 112 Fairview Ave.

Multi-family design awards went to Innovative Site Development and Mr. and Mrs. W. Heffner for 406-408 Bernal St. and to Building Design and Landscaping and Dianne Brown for 600-609 41st Ave.

Awards for remodeling and renovation went to: Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Canepa, 521 Atlantic Ave.; the City of Santa Cruz and Dr. Richard Andrews, Murray and East Cliff Dr.; the Santa Cruz Seaside Co., Bill Bagnall Architect, Ken Recker, interior design, and Doni Tunheim, color design for the Arcade Building at the Boardwalk.

Awards went to the City of Capitola and to Rick Karleen, Linden Coffee and Greg Tedesco for renovation and restoration of the

Capitola Wharf. The Santa Cruz City Museum was noted for creative remodeling, along with the Children's Outdoor Theater and 120 Archer St., owned by Dr. and Mrs. J. B. Deck.

In the horticulture category, awards went to Brookshire Garden at 1905 7th Ave., owned by Mr. and Mrs. E. Brookshire; the UCSC Arboretum, the UCSC Farm, Bayview School Park and Playground, Pinto Lake Park in Watsonville, and Seacliff Minipark.

SCOPE presents the annual awards to praise good design. In the past, the organization has pushed for a city sign ordinance, helped bring underground utilities to the county, helped preserve historical buildings and planted shrubs and trees for beautification.
