



Frazier Case To Grand Jury

The Grand jury will hear the case against John Linley Frazier, 24, accused slayer of five people, at 2 p.m. today.

Frazier, sallow faced and appearing somewhat agitated, entered Judge Donald O. May's courtroom at 8:30 a.m. where prosecutors requested a continuance to allow the Grand Jury to hear the case.

Frazier, in jail denims and manacled, shook his head as deputies unlocked the restraining devices.

"Bad, bad, bad," he murmured.

He sat, flanked by two deputies, and made no comment when Deputy District Attorney Art Danner presented an affidavit spelling out the DA's intention to take the case to the Grand

Jury and requested a continuance.

Deputy DA John Frye told the court that "numerous pieces of evidence pertaining to the case have been found in the last few days" and had been sent to Sacramento for identification. Frye said the DA's office needed until 2 p.m. to prepare its presentation to the Grand Jury.

The prosecution's motion to continue was countered by defense attorney James Jackson's motion to dismiss charges against Frazier.

Judge May denied that motion and a subsequent motion to set bail.

"The prisoner is remanded to the custody of the Sheriff," May said, and adjourned court.

Frazier will not appear before the Grand Jury when it convenes this afternoon, according to District Attorney Peter Chang.
