

Although poultry farms and "chicken ranches" were present in a widespread area, perhaps the greatest concentration of poultry-men was in the northeast corner of town. For some time the area along the DeLaveaga park foot-hills now known as Prospect hills now known as Prospect Heights and stretching southward the area now bisected by the Watsonville freeway, was frequently alluded to as "Chickentown.

During that period, the Santa Cruz Farm Bureau Egg Laying Contest plant was developed, with all of Santa Cruz, including the chamber of commerce, in full approval. Here the celebrated egg laying contests of the 1920's, were held, gaining nationwide atten-tion. Trap nested birds made out-standing records during the 13 years the contests were conduct-
