## **County School Elections Feature Few Surprises**

There were few surprises in yesterday's county-wide school trustee election. Less than 3 per cent of the registered voters turned out in the seven northern county districts where there was competition among the candidates. Incumbent Alice Earl Wilder was easily re-elected to the county board of education, area one, by a total vote of 577. Donald G. Fraim followed with a total vote of 356 and Irene Ray with 57 votes.

## 2 Americans **Executed By Cuba Regime**

Washington (P). — The state department today accused the Castro government of executing two U.S. citizens without their trial, in violation of "elementary standards of justice practiced by civilized nations over the world."

The department also sought tew assurances of safety for U. citizens in Cuba, but reported communications blackout had t the normal diplomatic channels to Havana.

It noted press reports of arrests of a number of Americans, including news correspondents.

The two Americans whom the pro-Communist Castro government announced today it had executed had been arrested before thec urrent outbreak of fighting. They were charged with anti-Castro activity. They were Angus Jack McNair Jr., of Miami, Fla., and Howard F. Anderson of Yakima, Wash.

State Department press officer Lincoln White said: "As far as we know, these executions have taken place, perhaps without a trial, and in any case without a fair trial, and we are asking the Swiss government to give us reports on what is taking place."
