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Loan Release Demanded By Kidnaper

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - A man who demanded release from a \$130,000 loan took a loan company director hostage today and forced him, with the muzzle of a sawed-off shotgun wired to his neck, to drive a stolen police car to the gunman's apartment, police said.

Later, police said, the gunman threatened to detonate

nitroglycerine unless he was released from the loan. Police said the mortgage company was in the process of

drawing up the release papers.

The hostage was identified as Richard O. Hall, 42, president of Hall-Hottell Co. Realtors. Police said he was abducted from his office in the Union Federal Savings and Loan Association shortly after 8:30 a.m.

A police spokesman identified the gunman as Anthony G. Kiritsis, 45, of Indianapolis. Hall's brother, William, said Kiritsis borrowed the money three years ago from Meridian Mortgage Co., of which Richard Hall is a director. The loan was due this month, the brother said.

"My brother, Dick, told him the loan was coming up, that it was due," William Hall said. "That must have set him off."

Witnesses said Kiritsis was armed with a pistol as well as

the shotgun.

He forced Hall to walk in shirtsleeves in near-zero weather about four blocks to the Indiana Statehouse, where Kiritsis grabbed the keys to a police car and forced Hall to drive to the Crestwood Village Apartments, where Kiritsis lives in a third-floor apartment, police said.

"There, ol' Dick, you're gonna drive," a newsman heard the gunman say as the two got into the marked patrol car. They drove off with the car's red light flashing and several

police cars following.

Once at the apartment building, the gunman told police he had hidden nitroglycerine within the complex and threatened to detonate it unless his demand for release from the

Marion County Sheriff's Deputy Ronald Beasley, an acquaintance of Kiritsis, was in telephone contact with him and relayed the demand.
