## Newly-Acquired Animal Center Planning Open House Sunday

The newly-acquired Santa Cruz County Animal Welfare center in Live Oak is easily found when people have animal problems.

An average of 50 calls per day — on problems ranging from lost dogs to a stray coon — find their way to the office located at 2200 7th avenue.

Few persons have taken the time to visit the source that solves many of their problems. Mrs. Alva Engberg, pound manager, said that many persons do not know about the pound.

To acquaint the general public with the gleaming row of kennels and spacious two-acre site, an open house is set for Sunday from 11 o'clock in the morning until 3 p.m.

At the present time the center has 25 dogs. Mrs. Engberg reported that the pound receives a wide range of calls concerning coons, skunks, foxes, birds, cows and horses.

"We also have many cruelty calls," she declared.

The pound is open from 9 a.m. until 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. All emergency calls are received and handled through the sheriff's office.

Financing the pound operation is the animal welfare association. Formerly the site of the Merriwag kennels, the buildings have been renovated and there are 20 dog runs. Mrs. Engberg reported there is space for 75 dogs.

Pound contracts for the county and Capitola are handled by the association. The president reported that the two contracts do not provide enough money to break even on operation costs.

"There is no money left for improvements on the property," she pointed out.

To raise funds for improvements, the association conducts

bazaars, rummage sales, and smorgasbord luncheons.

The pound is run by seven persons. They are Steve Stevens, poundmaster; Paul Borges, assistant poundmaster; Ray Quinn, deputy poundmaster; Robert Need, kennelman; Mrs. Goldie Stevens, receptionist; Mrs. Inez Smith, bookkeeper, and Mrs. Engberg, manager.

Serving as volunteer workers are Mrs. Engberg and Mrs. Smith.

Last July the association purchased the former Merriwag kennels.
