They visited Arlington National Cemetery and Mt. Vernon in Virginia and spent a whole day at the Smithsonian Museum.

The trip was open to 15 eighth grade students and cost \$619. Parents paid for most of it but at least one student, Geoff Saccone, is working off the cost. And Stacy Todd said she did a lot of babysitting to pay her way.

Favorite sites were the Voice of America, where broadcasts in 42 languages are delivered daily; the F.B.I. building, where the students saw a demonstration of machine guns; and the Kennedy


graves at Arlington National Cemetery.
