They may choose to swim, fish or boat in the camp's dammed-up portion of the San Lorenzo River, ride horseback, do jazzercizes or crafts - or simply watch while nature does her

Jane Carr and Paul Arbogast are co-directors of


the facility, which is sponsored by the Santa Cruz County Easter Seal Society and runs five 12-day sessions per season.


Many return each year — and so do many counselors, several of whom are from England.
