Historic Homes Tour Set Thursday

Leading off the Santa Cruz Heritage Days celebration will be a tour Thursday of historic homes, being sponsored by the Native Daughters.

Tour tickets for the 2 p.m. event now are on sale at Palomar hotel, Bowman and Forgey and the office of the Greater Santa Cruz Chamber of Commerce, according to Mrs. Albert Everly, tour chairman. She reports that tour buses will leave the parking lot at the corner of Cliff and Beach streets near the Casa del Rey hotel. Tickets, priced at \$1.50, also will be available at that time.

Santa Cruz history will come alive during the tour which will include:

The old Blackburn home on Ocean View avenue, now owned by the Dick Aldersons.

The Baldwin home on Locust street which was built in 1908 by F. D. Baldwin, pioneer coast rancher and Santa Cruz banker. It represents the architecture of its period, complete with bow windows, cupola, attic and carriage house. To this old home Mrs. William F. Steele has brought her Victorian furnishings from the historic Steele Ranch on the San Mateo County coast.

The School street adobe, built in the early 1800s and the oldest structure in Santa Cruz. Now a state monument, it is occupied by Mrs. Cornelia Hopcroft of the Rodriguez family. The Neary side of the adobe houses an antique shop.

The Victorian House, better known as the Monte Carlo, which is located on Third street. This home was built in 1889 by Major Frank McLoughlin.



DICK ALDERSON HOME on Ocean View avenue will be among historic Santa Cruz homes on the tour being sponsored Thursday by Native Daughters.

Tour-goers also will be given a tour of the Santa Cruz mission replica by Mrs. Phyllis Paten, will see the Alzina residence on Sylvar street, said to be the oldest frame dwelling in Santa Cruz; and also will see the Penniman home on Ocean

View avenue, constructed in the early '80s. Visits also planned to the Santa Cruz Wax museums.

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
