
Santa Cruz history will come alive during the tour which will include:

The old Blackburn home on Ocean View avenue, now owned by the Dick Aldersons.

The Baldwin home on Locust street which was built in 1908 by F. D. Baldwin, pioneer coast rancher and Santa Cruz banker. It represents the architecture of its period, complete with bow windows, cupola, attic and carriage house. To this old home Mrs. William F. Steele has brought her Victorian furnishings from the historic Steele Ranch on the San Mateo County coast.

The School street adobe. built in the early 1800s and the oldest structure in Santa Cruz. Now a state monument, it is occupied by Mrs. Cornelia Hopcroft of the Rodriguez family. The Neary side of the adobe houses an antique shop.

The Victorian House, better known as the Monte Carlo, which is located on Third street. This home was built in 1889 by Major Frank McLoughlin.
