An unheeded plea for a change of drivers ended in tragedy on a sharp East Cliff drive curve last night when a crowded convertible over-turned killing two persons, and injuring five.

The dead are: Miss Constance Painter, 23, San Jose State college student from New York, and Private Lewis Austin, 22, of Fort Ord.

The driver, Private William Henderson, 25, of Fort Ord, is being held in the county jail while under investigation for manslaughter.

swung down East Cliff drive from
the Buckhart candy factory, down
