# Two Die In East Cliff Drive Mishap

## SC Junior College Is Given Cabrillo Name

A new junior college took an early morning step toward academic realization today with the first official meeting of its board of trustees in the county schools office.

They gathered at 8 o'clock to select board officers, terms of office and select a name. These were the developments:

1. Cabrillo college was unanimously chosen as the name. It is taken from an early Portuguese ship pilot, Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, who roamed the west coast in 1542 with a Spanish expedition.

2. Board officers elected were: Keith Shaffer, chairman; Joseph Chamberlain, vice chairman; and Mrs. Marguerite Blaisdell, clerk. They will serve for one year and four months.

3. They drew colored soda straws for their terms of office. They are: One year, Harold A. Hyde; two years, Carl Conelly and Albert W. Rice; three years, Aruthr L. Hubbard and Shaffer; and four years, Chamberlain and Blaisdell. This was done to stagger the elections so that an all new board won't be elected at once. Norman Lien, superintendent of county schools, said that when these terms run out, the replacements will all have four-year terms.

4. A guide for the selection of a president-superintendent for the college was established. He must be between 30 and 60 years old, have at least a master's degree, California experience and building experience. Salary was placed between \$13,500 and \$15,000 or more.

Applicants will be screened by a university committee headed by Dr. James D. MacConnell, professor of education, director of school planning, University of California. Those recommended will be forwarded to the junior college board for a selection. The board felt a selection should be made during April.

5. No decision was made as to

whether or not classes would start this September. Lien said, however, that if they did, it would not affect county students now attending junior colleges in other areas.

Dr. Hugh G. Price, chief, bureau of junior college education, was present as an advisor this morning. He said 100 acres was the minimum amount of land required for a junior college.

He mentioned that classes could start using temporary facilities, and used as an example one college which used a high school for three years, holding classes from 4 to 10 p.m.

The board can institute a 35 cents operation tax. Dr. Price mentioned that legislation was being proposed for the state to furnish money to help a junior college make its initial start.

The board voted to encourage this proposed legislation.

## New Parking Commission To Meet Tomorrow

The city's newly appointed parking commission will meet in an organizational breakfast session tomorrow and survey the problems to be tackled in the months to come.

The commission was appointed by the city council from recommendations made by the Downtown Businessmen's association. City Planning Director Robert Cook and Councilman Paul Forgy will sit in on all meetings as liaison members.

The commissioners are: Sam Leask III, William H. Quale, Alvin J. Tosta, Kermit Darrow, Andrew Mekis, Frederick D. Van Selus and Joseph T. Nittler.

The commission will make recommendations to the city council on the operation of the present city off-street downtown lots as well as study the feasibility

## 5 Hurt As Convertible Overtakes

An unheeded plea for a change of drivers ended in tragedy on a sharp East Cliff drive curve last night when a crowded convertible overturned killing two persons, and injuring five.

The dead are: Miss Constance Painter, 23, San Jose State college student from New York, and Private Lewis Austin, 22, of Fort Ord.

The driver, Private William Henderson, 25, of Fort Ord, is being held in the county jail while under investigation for manslaughter.

According to the California Highway patrol, the 1952 convertible, carrying eight persons, swung down East Cliff drive from the Buckhart candy factory, down a straight stretch toward the beach, at 9:32 o'clock. The driver lost control in the sharp curve around Schwann lagoon and the car flipped.

According to Captain H. F. Calhoun of the CHP, Henderson wandered away from the accident scene. An all-points bulletin was put out with his identification. He was picked up minutes later and at first denied being the driver. Calhoun said Henderson had some blood on his clothes and when this was pointed out he admitted that he was the driver.

Injured were: Private Jimmy Inman, 22, Fort Ord, minor injuries; Private Robert Arnold, 22, Fort Ord, minor injuries; Kathleen Fraser, 21, San Jose State college student, minor injuries; Linda Erwood, 21, San Jose State college student, major injuries; Private Donald Cvek, 24, Fort Ord, minor injuries.
