Supervisors To Declare Scotts Valley A City At Meeting Tomorrow

Supervisors will officially declare Scotts Valley a city tomorrow, and open the incorporation election results to protest.

Ballots certifying the April 14 election have been canvassed by the county clerk's office, confirming the successful 344-to-323 vote margin of victory.

If no unforeseen problems develop, the board will officially declare the election results and send notification to state offices in Sacramento. Secretary of the State Frank Jordan then will issue incorporation papers to Scotts Valley.

But some cityhood opponents have declared they will throw a monkey wrench into the process by contesting the validity of the election in court. No protests can be filed until election results are announced by supervisors.

William G. Allen of Los Gatos has notified supervisors he intends to fight the election on the basis that over 21 "illegal" votes were cast.

He claims many persons living outside district boundaries were allowed to vote, and other persons voted who were not residents of the valley at all.

Other matters to be considered

by the board include these items:

CRIPPLED — Health Officer Dr. Gilbert Dunnahoo is requesting that \$7200 be made available in the crippled children's services budget for the remainder of the fiscal year.

REZONINGS — Rezoning affecting Scotts Valley include property adjacent to Canepa, Elena and LaCuesta drives to rural agriculture zoning; and a recommendation from the planning commission for denial of single-family zoning with lot limitations off the west side of Granite Creek road, on both sides of Southwood drive.

Commercial zoning for some parcels in Bay View Estates near Cabrillo college is proposed, but another recommendation for denial will be considered for land on the west side of Eldorado avenue between Capitola road and Harper street in Live Oak.
