### Chamber Banquet

## Area Still In Contention For University Campus

Santa Cruz is still under active consideration as the home for a new University of California general campus, and will stay that way until the final selection is made.

University of California Vice President Stanley E. McCaffrey made these statements in a speech before more than 400 persons at the Greater Santa Cruz Chamber of Commerce's annual membership banquet last night at Aptos Beach inn.

The high university official then added, "But I can't tell you where the campus is going to go. No one can right now. It will be up to the regents to decide where the campus would be served best."

In addition to McCaffrey's speech, the chambermen watched as the 1959 slate of officers and board members led by President Louis L. Haber were installed. Installation ceremonies were conducted by William Clayton, assistant general manager, California State Chamber of Commerce.

In a chamber innovation, "Citizen of the Year" awards were made to Worth Brown and Carl Conelly. Brown is chairman of the county's port district commission and was praised as the largest force behind efforts to bring a small craft harbor to Woods lagoon.

Conelly was described as pushing for formation of a junior college district with what approached missionary zeal. Past President Ernie Dillon, who presided over the meeting, made the awards.

Among his few comments and references to Santa Cruz as a hopeful in the coming site selection decision, McCaffrey said Santa Cruz was one of the most progressive communities in the state. He added the chamber's presentation of facts and materials to university officials in the site selection process was the finest he had seen.

McCaffrey never touched on his announced topic of "The Future of the University of California in the Era of Solid Fueled Rockets and Skyrocketing Costs." Instead he answered prepared questions asked by Gordon Sinclair, managing editor of The Sentinel and the head of the chamber's university site selection committee.

The answers touched on growth of the university (100,000 enrollment in the near future), high school educations (not really so bad), the over all level of American education (he did not subscribe to the post-Sputnik panic and educational soul searching) and the cost to the state per student in the university (\$1500 per year).
