SV Joins Hassle Over Annexations

Scotts Valley next week will jump into the controversy over Santa Cruz' "ultimate city limits" plan for future annexation.

Though not a legal city, members of the elected city council and the original incorporation committee will meet to draw up letters of formal opposition to the Santa Cruz plan, committee chairman L. J. Cardwell said today.

Capitola already has reacted angrily to Santa Cruz city's proposal to take in the tax-rich 41st avenue area.

The northern boundaries of

a 1990 Santa Cruz, as seen by the city planning commission, would be along the city limits proposed for Scotts Valley.

Scotts Valley is not yet a city, though incorporation was passed by a narrow margin in an April 14, 1964 election. Cityhood opponents contested the election in Superior court, lost, and are now filing an appeal.

"There is nothing we can do legally, but we can at least make our opinions known," City Councilman-elect Ken Stacy said when asked about the back-to-back city limits plan. He was backed by fellow Councilmen Elect Bill Lotts and C. R. Roberson.

"We don't like it at all," commented Cardwell. "This Santa Cruz plan doesn't leave us an inch to grow in on the south side."

Stacy said many Scotts Valley residents are in favor of an eventual city limits in the area originally proposed for Scotts Valley.

This includes Manana Woods, Sims road, and Apple Valley areas that Santa Cruz wants to annex, as well as a proposed and controversial cemetery.

The cities' future boundaries plans will go to the local agency formation commission, which has life and death powers over all annexation.

"The LAFC wants these plans so it can make sense out of the complex of annexation proposals," County Clerk Tom Kelley explained. "They will take the plans, study them, and then decide where the natural geographic boundaries are."

What effect an unofficial Scotts Valley proposal will have on the LAFC has not been determined.

But Scotts Valley, until it does become a city, will have no representation on the body.

Cardwell said Scotts Valley's proposal will be ready for submission to the LAFC within a month.
