Federal Study Overlooked Lighthouse Archeological Site

Investigators for the federal archeologist member of an Economic Development Administration completely missed a potential archeological site on Lighthouse Field between Pelton Avenue and West Cliff Drive when they were making studies for an environmental impact report on the proposed Lighthouse Point convention center complex.

The report, which was made available Dec. 29 last year to the President's Council on Environmental Quality. specifically stated, in fact, that "no historic place or landmark will be affected by the proposed project."

The potential site was found by Jody Bennett, a biologist -

environmental study team that completed last week an environmental impact report on the convention complex for the City of Santa Cruz.

The find was announced in the report issued by Lampman and Associates of Walnut Creek, the firm hired for \$12,000 by the city to make the environmental study.

A city official who asked not to be identified told the Sentinel Monday that Teachers Management and Investment Corp., which will develop a hotel, condominiums and a shopping center on 37.6 - acre Lighthouse Field, was aware of the potential archeological site found by Bennett.

This company is developing the private sector of the convention center complex while the city and county Joint Powers Authority is developing the convention hall itself.

In the Lampman and Associates report, Bennett wrote that after doing considerable walking in the area she had discovered kitchen midden materials on the property and may have located a Cruz. possible fire pit.

"The exact outline of the site was very difficult to determine due to the total surface distur-

bance of the soil by discing, motorcycles and autos," Bennett wrote. "However, the fire fracturd rocks may have been turned up by the discing, or the rocks could have been the fire

The Lampman report recommends delays in the convention center project pending investigation of the possible archeological find.

Ironically, however, the federal investigation that missed the find was less kind in other ways to the controversial project than was the pit of campers from early investigation by the Lampman group for the city.

The federal report listed more negative than positive opinions of the project. The Lampman report, on the other hand, indicates the proposed convention complex will provide the jobs and other financial benefits it is designed to provide, and that it will do

this without intolerable sociological effects upon the city as a whole.
