The key to car thievery is key!

The key to car thievery is—

The simple act of removing it
when parking — requiring only
an erg or two physically and perhaps an ohm of thinking power
— would cut this crime from 50
to 60 per cent.

More than 50,000 cars are
stolen every year in California—
from 10 to 18 a month here in
Santa Cruz, within the city.

In more than half of these
cases, all the thief has to do
is to get in the car, turn the
key conveniently left there by
the owner, and drive away.

Last month, according to the
police files, 10 cars were stolen
in the city. Seven have been recovered and three arrests have
been made so far. It's only a
natter of time that the other
hieves will be found out.

He glanced into a car, saw keys in ignition, got in and drove it away. He drove it about town for an hour and finally lost control and crashed it. He was arrested rested.

January 15: Young man came to police station, saying he took his girl to show in dad's car; parked in Safeway lot at 8 p.m. After the show he discovered the car was gone

He said he took the keys from the ignition, but laid them on the floor board.

September 9: Woman reported parking her car on Rigg street parking her car on Rigg street at 8 p.m.; returned in hour to find car gone. Her doors had been left unlocked and she left the keys in the ignition. The car

the keys in the ignition. The car later was recovered in San Jose.

August 13: Police arrested man who went into car lot, took the keys from an Olds and had duplicate made at locksmith, later returning the original. That evening he took his new key to the lot and drove the car away.

February 12: Man reported car stolen from Goss avenue. He said he had taken the key out but left the ignition switch unlocked, so that the thief did not need the key. He simply turned the switch.

March: six stolen, five recovered, one juvenile arrested.

April: Twelve stolen, 10 recovered, six persons arrested.

May: Eighteen stolen, all recovered, seven arrests.

June: Eleven stolen, nine recovered, six arrests, including two juveniles.

Through excellent local police work, most of the cars are recovered. But thieves are not easy on automobiles, many are recovered damaged.

Here are some tips to keep your car where you park it.

1. Always take the key, and if you drive a model in which the ignition can be left in an open position — lock it.

2. Lock your car, including the wind wings.

3. Park in a well lighted area if possible.

It also will help to spray the ignition system with liquid plastic which prevents use of

It also will help to specification system with liquid plastic which prevents use of a jumper wire or metal foil to short circuit the system.

It is also an idea to punch out the identifying numbers on car keys, after first recording


the numbers on car keys, after first recording the number at home.
