SOQUEL » After countless pre-dawn walks and thankless covert poop-scooping off neighbors' yards, more than a thousand area dogs returned the favor to their owners on Sunday.

Capitola resident Sandy Rich even called the Spring Dog Festival a "date" with her 7-year-old bluetick walker hound Rome.

"This is a beautiful place, and I live in Capitola and like to support local (ventures)," Rich said while she watched dogs and humans dancing to the latest hits

during a Santa Cruz Dog Training Club presentation.

The annual festival - a sort of dog owners' social where canines large and small mingle - drew thousands to the fields behind Soquel High School under sunny skies. A chain of information booths shared space with three large enclosed rings featuring dog herding, lure coursing and dog obedience demonstrations. The most coveted event, lure coursing, had first-timers and more experienced canines chasing a rag around a ring like it was the largest, juiciest steak they had ever seen.

While many queued up for the race course, the 1.500 dogs expected to turn out for the event trotted nearby in various states of dress, like their human companions — some casual, others all decked out.

Toffee, a 2-year-old Jack Russell mix rescued from San Francisco had the hair on his back dved in rainbow shades. Human companion and groomer Mel Lion from Watsonville said Toffee takes the dve-iob as a treat, because he gets to sit through a dedicated session with the heat drver.

In addition to Toffee, accompanying Lion were fellow small dogs Henry, wearing a kerchief and sparkling collar, and Penguin, a toy poodle going milky-eved and blind from age, and missing his left foot from his puppy mill days, Lion said.

"I come here every year," Lion said during a break from her browsing. "I like the lure coursing a lot, and the photos and just walking around and mingling with people and their dogs. It's a nice way to get with a lot of other dogfriendly dogs and people. This is more of a social for humans."
