

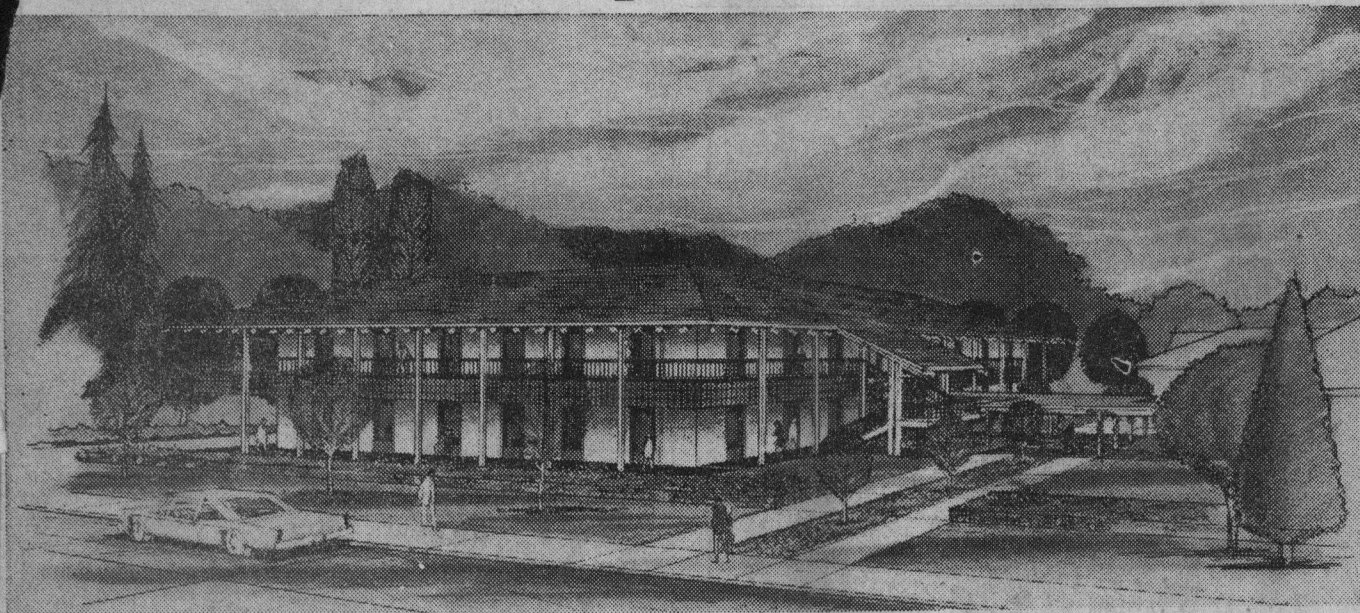

SC's New City Hall Addition



This is the \$400,000 city hall addition which should be nearing completion a year from now. Schematic plans for the addition, designed by Robert Stevens Associates, were approved Tuesday night by the city council.

The two-story building is seen here from Church street, with the corner of the existing city hall at the extreme right. The building will blend closely with the California Spanish style of the old building, with the roof of the same tile and walls of stuccoed cement. The balcony facing will also be tile, and fire-treated beams will protrude under the eaves.

Final drawings should be ap-

proved and bids awarded for the building shortly after the start of the year, and the building will be finished in fall of 1967, officials said. The addition will contain 15,000 square feet, more than doubling the present building's 13,500 feet.

Offices will be arranged around a central core containing rest rooms and hallways connecting all the departments. Public circulation will be around the perimeter of the building, on the balcony or sidewalk.

A landscaping contract will be let separately, but plans now call for a patio and fountain between the old and new buildings. A covered breezeway, seen

at right, will link the buildings.

The ground floor of the addition will be home to the water department, finance and records, and data processing departments. Upstairs will be planning, building inspection and public works.

The police department then will take over the existing north wing now occupied by water and finance records. The city manager, personnel office, and the mayor-council office will move into the south wing where public works and planning are

located. The auditorium will move from the auditorium into the present city manager-personnel office.

The addition is the first stage

of long-range expansion plans. Phase two, in the early 1970s, will be construction of a separate police facility. Phase three, in the 1980s, probably will see the old city hall torn down and replaced with a new structure with more space.

City voters last year approved a \$300,000 bond issue toward building the addition, but the total cost will approach \$500,000. The remaining money will come from the general fund.

City manager David Koester said the bond issue sum was set before any solid cost studies had been made to determine how much expansion was needed and what it would cost.
