Opening Service At First Baptist Church

First Baptist church will have its opening service in its newlycompleted sanctuary Sunday at 10:50 a.m. Rev. Erik Madsen will preach on "The House of God."

The new church seats nearly 400 persons; construction began on it in June of 1966 following an April 1966 groundbreaking.

Architects are Leslie I. Nichols, A. I. A. and Edgar R. Zimmer of Palo Alto. Contractor was F. B. Stearns Construction company of Aptos. Total cost of the church plant is approximately \$258,000 which includes landscaping and furnishings. Current total indebtedness is now down to less than \$85,000 according to Rev. Madsen who credits all church committees with doing a fine piece of work.

The building committee consists of: A. W. Anderson, Frank Black, George Haney, Mrs. F. S. March, Mrs. Clarence Nielson, C. A. Rhoades, Ray Thomas, Steven A. Traylor and L. J. Thorp who served as chairman.

Capital funds director for the project was Rev. Harold Litsey of the American Baptist Home Mission society.

The church began as the Baptist Temple, organized in 1858 in Santa Cruz with Rev. C. Sprague as pastor. The 32 by 50-foot wooden building first stood on Locust street, was moved in 1887 to Walnut ave-
