The Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk turns 100 this summer - a landmark birthday for any amusement park, let alone one situated on prime oceanview property.

Since their heyday in the early 1900s, dozens of waterfront parks have fallen to development, neglect or simply changing times and tourist tastes, including many big names: San

ANNIVERSARY EVENTS

Art exhibits, a new historical book and a summer's worth of beachfront events will mark the centennial. All events at the Boardwalk are free:

The celebration

This Saturday, sky-divers, high-dive acts and a concert by Papa Doo Run Run will kick off the birthday bash. High-dive and trampoline shows will take place at noon, 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. The Watsonville Community Band plays at 1 p.m. The sky-dive show, with beach landing, will be at 5 p.m. And the free concert starts at 6.

Next Sunday, there will be encore performances of the high-dive and trampoline shows at noon, 2 p.m. and 4 p.m.

To afford good views to as many spectators as possible, only low-back lawn chairs and small beach blankets will be allowed.

Both days, Boardwalk rides open at 11 a.m.

STARS ON THE BOARDWALK

Over the years, hundreds of celebrities — musicians, actors, sports stars, politicians and business tycoons — have performed, appeared or filmed at the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk or the Cocoanut Grove, or simply stopped by for a visit. Some stayed at the Casa del Rey hotel, the Boardwalk's swanky neighbor. Others performed on the beach in front of the Boardwalk.

Artifacts, memorabilia and artwork will be on display at the Santa Cruz Museum of Art and History through Sept. 2 and at all three Santa Cruz County bank locations through Aug. 30.

Boardwalk-inspired works of art by Sherry Karver and new-media projects by University of California-Santa Cruz students will be on view through July 8.

The movie

In the 1987 teen vampire flick, "The Lost Boys," Santa Cruz and the Beach Boardwalk sub for the fictional town of "Santa Carla." The movie will be shown outdoors on the beach at 8:30 p.m. July 25. Admission is free.

The screening is part of the Alamo Drafthouse Cinema's Rolling Roadshow, which brings classic movies to their home locations. 8. D, the Moorish style of the Alhambra in Spain.


9. B, Sal came from San Francisco's Playland-at-the-Beach.

10. C, Marini's sells 14 flavors: banana, butter toffee, cherry, chocolate, cinnamon, licorice, molasses, peanut butter, peppermint, piña colada, raspberry, strawberry, vanilla and watermelon. But Joe Marini III promises a few special flavors will be added for the centennial this summer: The bubble gum and cappuccino flavors will return, and a new one — chocolate peanut butter — will be introduced. (Marini's, by the way, is celebrating its 92nd year at the Boardwalk.)


