Some 1800 spectators, made up mostly of families and friends of the 86 undergraduates, destined soon to become alumnus, witnessed the first commencement ceremonies in the two-year history of Santa Cruz' beautiful contribution to UC.

Following the Invocation, given by The Very Reverend George M. Benigsen, fellow at Cowell college and Dean of the Holy Virgin Russian Orthodox Cathedral, New York, appeared UCSC's popular chancellor, Dean E. McHenry, who delivered the "message to the candidates."

After addressing himself to the purpose of UCSC, its colleges, and recalling the intimate joys that both faculty and students found during those first formulating months, as UCSC went through a period of incubation, then he turned to the subject of his address -- "The Good Alumnus."


"Now you face the task of being a good alumnus," he told the graduating students. "This requires that you keep in touch with your alma mater, know her problems, and do something about them."

One of the "somethings" he cited was capitol.

"To grow and prosper Santa Cruz must have not only state and federal construction funds, but about \$1 million per year in private gifts and grants," he said.

"This money is very hard to raise. Major foundations often ban grants for construction. Most well-to-day individuals and some foundations confers honors

Undergraduate degrees were conferred by Acting UC President Harry R. Wellman. Each of the candidates for the Bachelor of Arts degree was presented in turn by the Provost of his college, Dr. Page Smith of Cowell college and Dr. Charles Page of Stevenson college.

Presentation of the degrees was followed by a performance of Handel's "Andante" and William Van den Burg's "Campus Song," by the commencement day orchestra, under the direction of William Van den Burg, acting professor of music and fellow of Crown college.

Acting President Wellman conferred the graduate degrees. King-Thom Chung, of the Republic of China, and Kung Wu Lee, of Korea, were both granted Master of Arts

degrees; Michael Leigh Evans, of Cadillac, Michigan, received his Ph.D. All are graduates in biology.

Honorary degrees were conferred on Eugen Rosenstock-Huessy, educator and and social philosopher, presented by Provost Page Smith. LL.D. (Doctor of Laws) degree; Norman Hulbert Strouse, book collector and chairman of the board and chief executive officer, J. Walter Thompson Company. presented by UC Regent H.R. Haldeman, L.H.D. (Doctor of Humane Letters) degree: Charles Delorma Wheelock, retired rear admiral, USN, research engineer, and educator, presented by Chancellor Dean E. McHenry, D.Sc. (Doctor of Science) degree, and Abe Mordecai Zarem. vice president and a director. Xerox Corporation, and chairman of the board. Electro -Optical Systems, Inc., presented by UCSC Vice Chancellor Francis H. Clauser . LL.D. (Doctor of Laws) degree.

The University hymn and the Benediction, delivered by Father Benigsen, were followed by the Recessional as The Commencement Day Orchestra played "March," by William Van den Burg, and UCSC had passed through another first.
