

Tot Parade, Queen Coronation, Sports Notables On Program At Community Fair This Weekend

A children's parade, coronation of the queen, a sports program at which two famous personages are slated to appear, are among the highlights scheduled for this week-end at the Santa Cruz Community Fair.

Hundreds of children are expected to enter the Kiddie Day parade tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock.

The line of march will start at May avenue and Leonard street, go on May avenue to Water street and thence to the fair grounds and inside the big top.

Every entry will receive a free ride on one of the many amusement devices at the fair, and there will be prizes in each division, including a special award of a bicycle.

The first division of the parade will be divided into three sections: All nations division, impersonation division and stork book division. The second will be for youthful cowboys and girls, and floats will compete in the third section. Kids and their pets will make up the last division of the parade.

Also set for tomorrow at the fair is the coronation of Queen Rita Franks, which will take place at 10 p. m. under the big top.

Tonight at 7 o'clock a special broadcast by the Triple-aire, an instrumental trio, will be made over station KSCO. The public also is invited to attend this event, which will be on the stage under the big tent.

At 10 o'clock tonight the program will feature Henry Armstrong, the only man to hold simultaneously the featherweight, lightweight and welterweight championships in the boxing world, as well as Tiny Roebuck, noted wrestler and referee.

A special program of kiddies' boxing tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock will be refereed by Armstrong.

With last night's crowd at the second day of the fair estimated at 4000, the sponsoring group, the junior chamber of commerce, hopes that the five-day attendance will top the 20,000 mark for paid admissions, making a total attendance of 30,000 or more, since children do not have to pay.

The fair will end Sunday night, with closing ceremonies slated for 10:30 p. m., and special prize awards to be made at 10 o'clock that night. Throughout the week-end the fair will continue to offer rides, games, commercial exhibits, hobby shows, auto show and talent contests for the amusement of Santa Cruzans.

Tomorrow and Sunday the gates will open at 1 o'clock. Tonight the fair will open at 6 o'clock.

Brookdale Man Tells Jury His Car Did Not Kill Floyd Schelin

With no outward show of nervousness, Weldon Joseph Brown, 33-year-old Brookdale cabinet maker, took the stand this morning to testify in his own behalf that he was not responsible for the death of Floyd Schelin, 46, of Felton.

The testimony was completed and the arguments terminating the case were at an end before noon today with the judge's instructions to the jury all that remained before that body retired to reach a verdict.

The jury was expected to receive the case late this afternoon.

Brown, who is charged with drunk and run driving and manslaughter, told the seven-woman jury that he saw no car on the road during the early morning of April 25 as he drove from the Enze River drive to the Tavern to Santa Cruz.

"What there is about your case, I leave to his counsel," he said.

"Nothing," he said. "I am not out."
