Beach Boardwalk Celebrates 100th Birthday

he Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk is celebrating a milestone 100th birthday this coming summer. The West Coast's only major seaside amusement park attracts more than three million visitors a year.

Dubbed the "Coney Island of the West" during the early part of the 20th century, its popularity was perhaps second only to New York's famous amusement park. The Boardwalk's remarkable history also includes the first Miss California pageants, the greatest of the big bands, and a collection of daring performers who flew through the air, sometimes on fire, giving beach goers the thrill of a lifetime.

When the Boardwalk was built, going to the seashore was considered healthy, and taking "sea baths" was beneficial to the body. Eventually Santa Cruz developed a reputation as a resort town complete with a casino.

In those days a casino was a place for entertainment and a place to win prizes. No gambling was done there. In 1908 an attraction was constructed called the "Scenic Railway."

The Boardwalk's first "thrill ride" accelerated to a whopping 25 mph. In 1911 the carousel was built and installed in its current location. Two chariots were built for the women who for modesty's sake did not sit upon the horses. The 73 carved and bejeweled horses have been painstakingly restored over the years.

Those familiar with the carousel know about the ringdispensing machine that adds a bit of a challenge to the ride. Brass rings used to entitle riders who nabbed one to a free ride. Now they are tossed into the mouth of a clown a few feet away and cause the clown's eyes to light up. The Carousel is one of the two national landmarks on the property The Giant Dipper is the other one.

Arthur Looff who created the rickety, wooden, roller coaster, once said that the ride's design was intended to evoke a "combination earthquake, balloon ascension, and aeroplane drop." It was built in son of the Aptos Sheriff's Office and Coast Commercial Bank. Their collaborative efforts to eliminate graffiti on community property have been funded by Coast Commercial Bank's first donation to the cause of \$500.

After presenting some wonderful slides of the behind-thescenes operations there, he described some of the upcoming events planned to celebrate this cherished landmark's centennial.

The Boardwalk will host free performances of the Moscow Circus and have an outdoor screening of the film "Lost Boys." There are plans for a gala, concerts, shows, and for the first time since 1974, fireworks will return to the Boardwalk.
