B of A Manager Captures Bandit

A 21-year-old mental patient on a day pass from General Hospital was arrested Friday afternoon, minutes after he allegedly held up the Bank of America at Pacific Avenue Mall and Soquel Avenue, for \$960.

Booked for armed robbery was Jerry Emerson Johnson, listed by the Santa Cruz Police Department as a "transient."

He was apprehended with the money by Bank Manager Ben Pino after a short chase.

Johnson's comment after his capture was short:

"I'm sorry," he said.

The holdup occurred about 1:20 p.m. and few customers conducting their after-lunch business knew that anything unusual was taking place.

According to police reports, Johnson walked up to Teller Ann Fenske and slipped a piece of paper across the marble counter.

The note read: "Okay, I have a gunne. (Sic) I want 20 big ones. Hurry up."

Mrs. Fenske looked at the note and then looked up at Johnson.

At that moment, she said, she thought he was kidding because of the way "gunne" was spelled and because there was a flower drawn on the note.

But then the holdup man told her, "Hurry up, I have a gun," in a "kind of deep muffled voice."

She asked, "How would you like this?"

Johnson then pushed a brown paper bag over to Mrs. Fenske.

The teller opened the bag and looked inside and saw a carton of cigarettes.

Another glance at the holdup man and she opened her money drawer and started to fill the bag.
